A Gift of Learning Report on Junior Workshop

Introduction

This report outlines the success and impact of the recent workshop held for junior professed members at the Benedictine of Annunciation, Gihindamuyaka, Rwanda. The workshop brought together 50 participants from eight Benedictine communities across

Kenya, Uganda, and Rwanda. This gathering was aimed at empowering young members of the Benedictine communities through spiritual and leadership development, supported by generous funding that enabled this initiative.

Funding: The financial support received was crucial in facilitating the logistics, materials, and accommodation.



1. Introduction to Canon Law

This session provided an understanding of Canon Law, helping participants appreciate the legal framework governing religious life and how it applies to their community roles and responsibilities.

2. Liturgy

Participants delved into the meaning and structure of liturgical practices, fostering a deeper appreciation of worship and communal prayer as a vital part of Benedictine life.

3. Team Building

Through various team-building exercises, members strengthened their bonds, learned the importance of collaboration, and developed skills in communication and mutual support.

4. Benedictine Spirituality

This session focused on the values and principles of Benedictine spirituality, encouraging young members to deepen their commitment to the Rule of St. Benedict and to find personal meaning in the community's shared practices.

5. Visit to Sovu Monastery

The visit to Sovu Monastery allowed participants to observe and learn from another Benedictine community, creating opportunities for cross-community connection, inspiration, and the sharing of challenges and best practices.

Workshop Outcomes and Impact

1. Enhanced Spiritual Growth and Leadership Skills

The sessions were carefully structured to foster both spiritual and personal growth, with a focus on leadership development. Participants expressed a newfound desire to take on

leadership roles in their communities, feeling more prepared and motivated to contribute actively.

2. Strengthened Inter-Community Relationships

With participants from Kenya, Uganda, and Rwanda, the



workshop fostered a strong sense of unity and camaraderie. These connections are essential for future collaboration and support among young Benedictine members across regions.

3. Empowerment Through Learning and Sharing

The sharing of experiences, challenges, and aspirations among participants was highlighted as a key benefit, providing a pathway to spiritual growth and personal transformation. The opportunity to learn from each other helped participants realize the shared nature of their journey, building resilience and confidence.

4. Increased Interest in Further Formation and Growth

The workshop inspired junior members to continue their formation journey with renewed enthusiasm, seeking more knowledge and support to deepen their faith and strengthen their communities.

Conclusion and Future Outlook

The junior workshop at the Benedictine of Annunciation was a resounding success, fulfilling its purpose of empowering young members for leadership, fostering unity across communities, and supporting spiritual growth. A Gift of Healing



St. Scholastica's Hospital is a seven-year old, Level 1 hospital, owned by the Missionary Benedictine Sisters of Tutzing. It is located in one of the economically disadvantaged regions of the Philippines and the only one in the district. Traveling from the main city to reach the hospital is a seven-hour trip over approximately 285 kilometers of intermittent paved and very challenging rugged roads.

The rural setting and the distance from the city are setbacks for attracting doctors to stay for a long period in the hospital. Luckily, two specialist doctors residing in the city have committed themselves to rendering service in our hospital. But the cost of fetching and taking them home is quite challenging for our secondhand donated vehicle. It has to traverse eight times within a month along vehicle unfriendly roads. Most of the time, the vehicle travels at night to accommodate the schedule of the doctors. Traveling at night along unlighted and unpaved roads is not easy for both the vehicle and the driver. Another vehicle to alternate with the present one assures us of extended years of service for our vehicles and diminished repair costs. Having a new, sturdy vehicle is a blessing to our drivers who do not need to worry anymore about their safety.

Our new vehicle is multi-purpose: It is used to transport medicine from the shipping port which is a two-hour drive, and other emergency

needs, and for the patients who need to go to charitable agencies for funding of their hospitalization.

A Gift of Empowerment

The AIM-USA grant has transformed our monastery's Vallombrosan Buffalo farm. With this support, we now produce our own high-quality buffalo milk greatly improving our cheese production. No longer relying on expensive lower quality milk from outside, we are moving towards true self-sufficiency.



Our monks have fully embraced the farm, seeing it as an important part of both their work and spiritual life. It has brought our community closer together through shared labor and prayer.

The project has also had a positive social impact. We have provided jobs to nine young people from disadvantaged backgrounds. These jobs have given them not only an income but also a sense of dignity and hope for a better future and strengthening our ties to the local community.

Looking ahead we plan to grow the farm from 10 buffaloes to 50.

This expansion will help us to become fully self-sufficient and allow us to offer even more jobs and support to those in need. By increasing our farm's capacity, we aim to create a lasting positive impact on both our monastery and the community.

The Monastic Formation Course in Rome For Religious

Upon receiving the scholarship for Monastic Formation, aimed at religious communities, we understand the need and the gain to increase knowledge to higher levels based on the teacher's knowledge presenting sources from various disciplines in the historical construction of monasticism.

A Gift of Self Sufficiency



The main purpose of our poultry project is to serve and save vulnerable people in the local community including the youth and the elderly. The youth have engaged in drugs and crime and the elderly are hungry and infirmed from HIV/ AIDS infections and other diseases.

The sisters supply chickens and eggs to families to enable them

to have good health, hope and live a long life. The project offers young people capital (chickens) to generate income and thus are employed. This has decreased incidents of crime in the area. This project has allowed the sisters to increase pastoral visits as they visit the aged and the ill and other vulnerable people. The project has given young pregnant girls an opportunity to engage in selling eggs and helping with the farm. We have bought an incubator machine for producing chickens and therefore the project goes on to benefit more vulnerable people.

Serving as a leader on the AIM USA board strengthened my commitment to live the gospel mandate of inclusion and action in ways I had never imagined. My support for the efforts of AIM USA will be ongoing, that's a promise.
